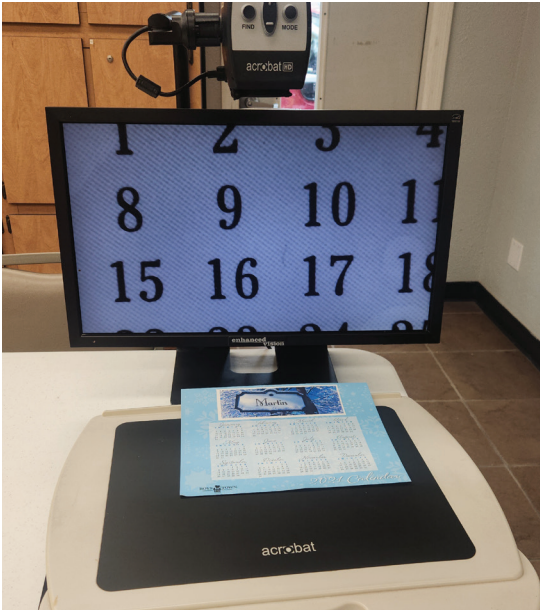

MEET THE PLAYERS: TOM & JEAN VANDERMEULEN

Tom grew up in Martin, a one-stoplight-town in mid-Michigan. The school there was equally small with no gymnasium, so softball was the go-to sport. Jean's locker was 3 down from Tom's, and they married shortly after graduation. Jean became a nurse, and Tom operated heavy equipment for a construction company and was also a parts manager for John Deere. Tom's parents started coming to Arizona in the 70's. Tom and his four older brothers and sisters eventually followed suit. One of Tom and Jean's three daughters is also in AZ, with another living in California and one back in Kalamazoo, Michigan. They have seven grandchildren. Tom played softball on a church-sponsored fast pitch



team from 7th grade until age 52! When a fellow ball player built a tennis/basketball court in his yard, the bat was traded in for a tennis racquet. Shortly after moving to FOS in 2015, the bat was dusted off – this time for slow pitch softball. Tom played for and coached the FOS Sparks team for two winter seasons, and has since been coaching Fall co-ed teams.

Jean used her nursing background to make safety improvements for the City of Mesa and FOS softball programs. She organized CPR/AED training around the valley and eventually passed the task to FOS to continue classes. Jean also stocks first aid kits for each FOS team and ensures basic medical information forms are included.

Ten years ago, Jean agreed to help with the Burger Luncheons and soon became Kitchen Supervisor. Jean and Tom are so happy to have joined FOS Softball Club which made nearly 100 new friends for them. Jean states that they are “living the dream” in AZ and wouldn't want to be anywhere else!

Fountain of the Sun Committees

Would you like to serve, consider serving or remain on one of the Fountain of The Sun Committees? Here are a few things you need to know.

There are six charter committees at FOS:

- **Activities**
- **Infrastructure Maintenance and Project Oversight (IMPOC)**
- **Long Range Planning (LRPC)**
- **Safety and Security**
- **Finance and Architecture**
- **Compliance**

Each committee generally has 5 to 7 members. These committees are appointed annually by the Board of Directors (BOD). The appointed year runs from June 1 through May 31 of the following year.

There are general rules for committees and each committee also has its individual charter spelling out the duties of that particular committee. Each committee is to have a chair, vice chair or co-chairs and a secretary elected by their committee at their June meeting each year.

Meeting Times & Applications

Committees set their own time and dates for meetings. Generally, they meet once a month unless the meeting is canceled by the chair of the committee for lack of business or other such reasons. The FOS BOD attempts to match applicants' occupation/education/life experience relevant to the duties of the committee they will serve.

The BOD also looks closely at applicants having volunteered in other capacities and having a heart for the future of the entire community, property values, and attracting future residents desiring to live in an Active 55+ gated community.

Committee Tasks & Reporting

Committees get their direction for tasks to accomplish from their charter and/or directly from the BOD. Occasionally, they may receive direction from the General Manager. Each committee has one of the elected BOD members serving as liaison/advisor to the committee. The liaison/advisor is to keep the committee on task and report back to the BOD on the progress of the committee. Committee Chairs may also report directly to the BOD. As per our governing documents, the BOD treasurer is automatically the liaison/advisor to the Finance Committee. The only other committee with such specifications for liaison/advisor is the Architecture and Compliance Committee. In our governing documents it directs that the BOD member to that committee serve as the chair of the committee.

On all of the other committees the BOD liaison/advisor cannot serve as an officer on the committee. Board of Directors Liaisons/Advisors are not to vote on the committee except under specified circumstances.

Important Role at FOS

Committees have a very important role in FOS. After a task/investigation is complete the committee makes a recommendation to the BOD. The BOD takes the recommendation and any other information and/or advice from listening to residents and makes a decision. The BOD may or may not agree with a committee recommendation. Some recommendations come from committees with a split vote of the committee and the BOD further vets the issue as needed.

Applications are now being accepted from those wanting to continue serving on a committee or wanting to begin serving on a committee. Applicants must be in good standing in the community. The BOD will review all applications and select committee members in May. This is all according to practice and our governing documents. 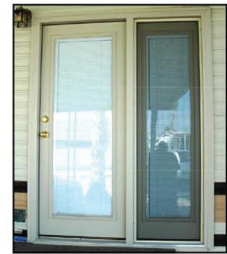

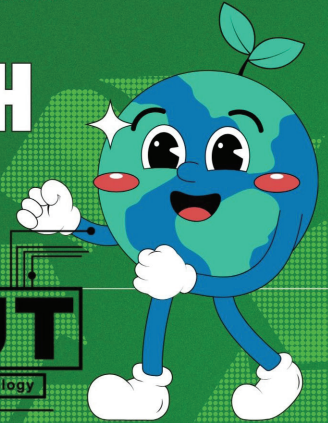

Sun, Moon and Stars in Their Courses Above

On March 20, 2026, the Vernal Equinox, the First Day of Spring, will occur. You've probably noticed that even now the sun is directly in front of you if you're heading west before sunset or east at sunrise, making driving a bit of a challenge.

This happens because everywhere on Earth the sun is rising due east and setting due west. This doesn't happen in summer or winter.

When I taught Earth Science in high school, I celebrated this day with my students, hoping to increase their awareness of what happens on the equinox. I would bring cupcakes, but not ordinary cupcakes. These were half yellow and half chocolate, with frosting that matched, representing the 12 hours of daylight and 12 hours of darkness that's taking place all over the world, no matter how far north or south you might be. The Spring and Fall Equinoxes are caused by the earth's position in its orbit around the sun. On all other days of the year, the tilt of the axis causes more sunlight to fall in one hemisphere or the other, creating shorter days in the north while they're longer in the south, and vice versa. But on the Spring and Fall Equinoxes everybody gets 12 and 12.

I am also fascinated by phases of the moon, eclipses, and many other observable occurrences caused by the movements of the earth, sun, moon, and planets - **"Sun, moon, and stars in their courses above."** I find it reassuring that we can count on regular, predictable astronomical line-ups to take place at their appointed times, just as they have been doing for thousands of years.

I've been known to go out and measure the angle of the sun in the sky, or to measure the sun's shadow at various times of the day, any day, simply out of curiosity. Now there are websites a person can use to find out anything he wants to know about angles of the sun, length of daylight, and any other calculation he might be curious about. My days of measuring these things directly are probably over too, although I must admit as I'm out walking if I see a straight pole casting a shadow, I may try to estimate the length of the shadow and mentally calculate how high the sun must be right now of how tall the pole is.

You may be wondering why I'm sharing this with you. Just to show you that I am truly weird? No, not for that. I just find it reassuring that we can count on astronomical line-ups taking place at their appointed times, as they have been for thousands of years. These are tangible evidences of God's faithfulness. He tells us why He set all this in place. **"Then God said, 'Let there be lights in the heavens to divide the day from the night; and let them be for signs and seasons, and for days and years'"** (Genesis 1:14).

The name equinox comes from two Latin words: *equi* meaning equal, and *nox* meaning night, because the length of night is equal everywhere on the planet that day. But when I celebrate the Equinox, it's not a celebration of the sun and earth, or their motions and angles. **I'm celebrating the faithfulness of our Creator God!**

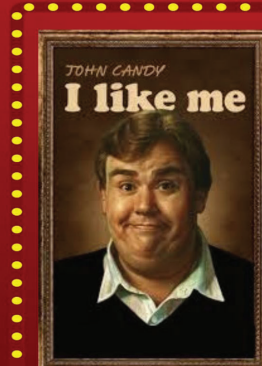

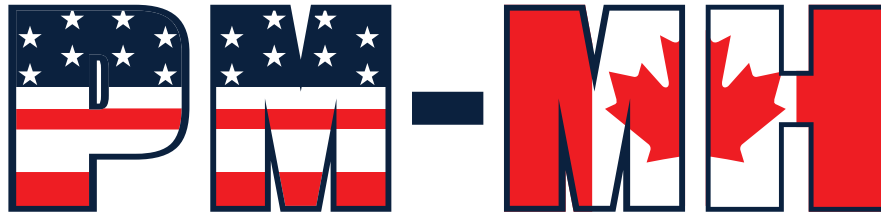
